We associate the word favor with "favorite." And perhaps we think of that spoiled "daddy's girl" or "momma's boy" who gets whatever he/she wants. But as we will see from Mary, being divinely favored doesn't mean entitled or guaranteed an easy life free of struggles. The word favor, used in this context, doesn't suggest that Mary is able to give favor to others. Rather, it means that she has received favor from God. He chose her to be the mother of our Savior.

- 1. What is God doing in your life right now that doesn't make sense?
- 2. Prior to this study, what has been your knowledge/opinion of Mary Put another way, what would you have said about her a month ago if—let's say—a five year-old child had said to you, "Tell me all about Jesus' mommy"?
- 3. The story of Mary raises so many important issues and questions. Her experience is first and foremost about change, about a life suddenly interrupted and radically redirected. How are you when it comes to change? Rate yourself on a 1-10 scale (where 1 "I break into hives if I have to get a new toothbrush!" and 10 "I go nuts if I don't get to change my job and my address about every six months!"). How possible is it for change-resistant people to, well, change?
- 4. In a matter of moments, Mary's entire world was flipped upside down. Talk about blind-sided! When in your life have you most dramatically seen your plans and dreams suddenly go up in smoke? What did you do (are you doing)?
- 5. Mary, despite being very young, demonstrated great maturity. She declared herself to be God's servant. She relinquished her plans, her future. In effect, she said, "I'm all in...let's do this." What does this reveal about her character and faith (especially when you consider that other, older biblical characters, like Moses and Jonah, argued with God when He called them to special tasks)?
- 6. Think about a time when you were selected for something wonderful (i.e., a great honor like being on an All-Star team, he or she said "I love you," given a big promotion at work). Now think about a time when you were approached about tackling a tough task, or chosen by a superior to handle an unpleasant situation, etc. Compare and contrast those different experiences. How was Mary's calling both at once?

Apply

- 1. What comes to mind when you hear the word favor? How would you interpret someone telling you, "God has favored you!"?
- 2. For the great majority of the world, God's calling is rarely as clear as what Mary received. Think about it. She got an angelic visitor... who brought her a heavenly message...and this was followed by a miraculous pregnancy. Mary is one of the few people in history who could never honestly say, "I didn't have a clue what God put me on earth to do."

But clear or not, God has plans and purposes for each of us (Ephesians 2:10). What do you believe God is calling you to do at this stage of your life, and why do you think that? How are you doing with that call?

4. The verses in Luke 1:26-38 don't have time stamps on them. That is, we don't know how long this interaction with Gabriel lasted. But it's worth noting that Mary doesn't ask for a few days or a couple weeks to think, pray, and/or talk through the angel's news with Joseph, her best friend, and/or her small group. Her submissive spirit of surrender is evident immediately. Where specifically in your life do you sense God calling (and yet you're stalling)? What will you do today to begin moving in a direction of trust and obedience?

Session 2: When You Feel All Alone

- 1. In what area of your life do you need an Elizabeth right now? Who can be that person for you?
- 2. In our last session we saw the angel Gabriel visit Mary and deliver the stunning news that God had favored her—that she would give birth to Israel's Messiah. Gabriel dropped that massive bombshell on Mary...and promptly disappeared. Though Mary accepted this news with remarkable humility, she had to be feeling overwhelmed. Though "the Lord was with her" she must have felt alone.
- 3. TA study of the Gospels reveals that Jesus engaged people in three primary contexts:
 - in large groups (sermons to the masses; feedings/healings of giant crowds);
 - in a small group setting (the 12 disciples; the smaller group of three within the 12);
 - one-on-one (Mary or Matthew, Zacchaeus or the rich young ruler)
 The implication is that as we follow Jesus, all of these settings are
 impor- tant to our growth.

 What is it about small groups and one-to-one relationships that
 makes them so indispensable to our spiritual and emotional health
 and growth? Why are personal face-to-face interactions preferable
 to exchanges via social media?
- 4. Upon seeing Mary at her door, Elizabeth erupted in praise (read Luke 1:42-45). How might her words have encouraged Mary?
- 5. Read Luke 1:46-55. Elizabeth's outburst caused Mary to break into a spontaneous song, with lyrics straight from the Old Testament. Clearly Mary knew big chunks of God's Word by heart, so that in such moments, she could call God's truth to mind.

Writer Kathleen Norris once said, "If I had to find one word to describe how belief came to take hold in me, it would be 'repetition.'" How much of God's Word have you repeated (i.e., repeatedly read and pondered) until it was imprinted in your memory?

In addition to memorizing, someone has said we can hear God's Word (taught or preached), read it, study it, and meditate on it. Which of these practices do you tend to do most and least?

6. Following Mary's visit, Elizabeth gave birth to her son, John (i.e., John the Baptist, the one prophesied by Isaiah who would be the forerunner of the Christ [see the "Did you know?" box about John the Baptist].) Interestingly, both mother and son had ministries of preparation: Elizabeth helped prepare Mary for what lay in front of her; John later prepared peoples' hearts to hear the good news announced by Jesus. What might a ministry of preparation look like today?

Apply

- 1. Gabriel told Mary that the Lord was with her. Then God confirmed His presence using Elizabeth's baby. How has God confirmed His presence in your life recently?
- 2. God knew He was asking both Mary and Elizabeth to live extraordinary lives ... lives that would be too much for them to handle alone. What in your life requires a close community of support, a circle of trust?
- 3. In what specific area of your life do you need to lean more fully on God's Word? Has anyone ever trained you in how to study God's Word for yourself?
- 4. What specific steps will you take beginning this week to gain a better knowledge of God's Word? Here's a thought: have you ever read the Bible i.e., from cover to cover? If not, check out Daily Walk, a monthly devotional magazine from Walk Thru the Bible that helps you read from Genesis to Revelation in one year (and understand what you're reading!). Here's another application. Pick out one verse say 2 Corinthians 5:17 and learn it by heart. Then share it daily with your spouse, kids, or a good friend. Next week, pick out a new verse say, John 10:10.

- 1. What heartbreak or disappointment are you struggling with right now?
- 2. Compare Luke 2:22-24 with Leviticus 12:6-8. What does this suggest about the "economic status" of Mary and Joseph? Does this surprise you? When in your life have you faced your biggest financial hardships? Describe that experience.
- 3. Read about devout old Simeon in Luke 2:25-35. What stands out to you? What can we learn from him? What quality (or qualities) in his life would you like to see in your own and why?
- 4. After gushing over Jesus, Mary's newborn son, Simeon somberly foretold the pain Mary would experience because of her child. What do you think he might say to the person who insists that those who are chosen by God are guaranteed health and wealth—in short, a blessed, problem-free life?
- 5. Why do you think, when Jesus said flatly, "In this world you will have trouble" (John 16:33), so many people are drawn to versions of the gospel that promise we will be kept from problems and poverty and sickness? In what ways is this teaching destructive?
- 6. In many parts of the world (and in many lives), things often get harder after a person comes to know Christ. Why is this so?

Session 3: When Life Breaks Your Heart

Apply

- 1. The life of Mary teaches us a somber lesson (that we'd rather not hear, much less acknowledge): suffering is part of the spiritual life. Life can break your heart. What's the most painful thing in your life right now?
- 2. As Simeon predicted, Mary's heart was pierced multiple times during the tumultuous and unpredictable brief life of her Son. When your own heart has been pierced, what has enabled you to keep going?
- 3. What do you think Mary thought when Simeon told her that her greatest blessing would also bring her the deepest personal pain? What would your assumption be if someone said this to you?
- 4. In a real sense, Mary—this woman who endured such heartache in being the mother of Messiah—was Jesus' first and best disciple. The last recorded words we have of her are found in John 2:5, "Do what he tells you." What specifically do you sense Jesus telling you to do right now in your life?

Session 4: When Life Must Go On



- 1. Remember the choices Mary and the others made. Which of these do you struggle with the most? What steps can you take to follow Mary's example?*
- Obey even when you don't fully understand.
- Wait for God to intervene in your life.
- Gather together and resist the tendency toward isolation. Pray even when your faith wavers.
- 2. Luke records the disciples asking the resurrected Jesus about His king- dom (Acts 1:6-7), and Jesus telling them bluntly, "It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set." Why do you think, despite this clear statement from Christ, so many Christians insist on trying to figure out the exact timing of the Lord's return?*
- 3. When heartbreak comes our way, we do have to go on. What lessons have you learned from others? What insights have you gained from your own experience?*
- 4. Jesus instructed the disciples to wait—which runs counter to the voices inside our heads that scream, "Don't just sit there...do something!" Where do you find yourself waiting on God? And how can this group encourage you to persevere and keep trusting?*
- 5. Parents know:
- that our kids aren't really "ours"—they belong to God and He has put them in our care for a brief window of time
- that our job description is to love them, teach them, point them to God, prepare them, and launch them (not hover over and control them)
- that the day is coming when our children will leave—and should leave the nest
- that the goal isn't to raise good kids...it's to raise God-loving adults

Still, even knowing the truth and wisdom of all that, it's painful to watch our kids grow up, to cut the cord, to let them go and find their place in this world. Like any mom, Mary wanted certain things for her Son—but as His disciple she had to surrender her desires to the will of God. What about Mary's parenting of Jesus inspires you as you pour into your children and prepare them for adulthood?

6. The disciples didn't just post vague status updates on social media. They gathered together face-to-face and prayed with and for each other. During those days of waiting in Jerusalem, they shared fears, doubts, tears, hopes, dreams, and laughter. Spend some time as a group doing that now. And if this group is disbanding now that you've completed the Chosen study, determine to find a new group to be part of.

Apply

- 1. Even when Mary and the others didn't know what their future held and weren't sure how to go on, they obeyed the Lord. They stayed in Jerusalem, which was a dangerous place. (Consider...if the authorities killed Jesus, what would they do to His followers?) What's the specific area of life in which you sense God urging you to trust and obey Him right now?
- 2. It took a lot of courage and faith for both Mary and John to be at the cross with Jesus. Who are the people who have walked through the worst times of your life with you?
- 3. Read 2 Corinthians 1:3-4—Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God. Why do you think it matters to God that we are able to accept His comfort and, in turn, comfort others?
- 4. Having completed this study, summarize the best lesson you learned. What is the most powerful insight you gained into the life of Mary?
